CREATION PROJECTS

Morah Rivka's Nursery students are pictured using playdough to shape the orb of the sun and its rays, and using tweezers to "fish" marbles out of a bowl to place on suction-cups atop fish cutouts. These are hands-on ways to learn about the Days of Creation, and at the same time work on their fine motor skills. The tweezer thing was quite the challenge!

THE "MAASER" CONNECTION

3rd graders were excited to report in TNT that



they found a connection between two subjects they are learning. In Chumash they

learned how Avraham was the first person to give away Maaser 10% of his possessions. In Mishna Rosh Hashanah they learned about the fiscal year for the Maaser given from a flock. They were so excited to learn the same idea in two different texts on the same day!

Kindergarten learned about the choice that Adam and Chava made in the Garden of Eden. They played this game to learn about choices. The two columns are two teams. Each front row got asked questions like: Should you go outside to play without telling your parents? Is it OK to walk away if someone wants to start a fight with you? If you think it's a bad choice you go to the chair without the smile. Then the group discussed each question. The rows kept moving forward with new questions. It was a great game, and thought-provoking, too!

They watched the eclipse from one front yard, but then hopped over the fence to a neighbor's backyard and saw it from there, too. As the student put it: It was nice to stand together and watch it as a group of Jewish families.
- One family was a little disappointed that the moon didn't appear as red as expected, but then they stepped away from the light outside their home into a dark spot, and they saw the redder coloring.
- It was amazing to watch the moon go through its entire monthly cycle in a very short time, and then go through that cycle backwards again. It was worth staying up!


NEW READS IN 4/5 GRADE

START OF GEMORAH SUKKAH

6/7 grade boys are learning Gemorah Sukkah with Rabbi Mendel. They are now onto the question of what is wrong with a Sukkah that is taller than 20 Amos. Stay tuned for 3 answers to that question! Speaking of Gemorah Sukkah, 8th grade girls learned a very sad story about Miriam bas Bilgah at the very end of the tractate. They first read it inside the Talmud text and then watched an 8-minute video (English subtitles) of the Lubavitcher Rebbe finding positive notes of inspiration from the story. In English class with Mrs. Crawford, after reading two Poe

stories, 8th graders are reading the Sherlock Holmes story "The Adventure of The Speckled Band" by Arthur Conan Doyle.



OCTOBER OUTDOORS

NATURE WALKS: It's getting colder but still not too cold so we can still enjoy going outside, taking nature walks, or even a drive out into the countryside, to see the beautiful leaf colors, take nice photos...

PICKING APPLES AND PUMPKINS
Some orchards still have apple varieties you can pick, and many farms have pumpkins to pick. There are many pumpkin recipes, you can even roast and salt the seeds!

FIRES There are lots of fallen twigs and branches around this time of year. Collect them for a firepit (only with constant adult supervision, of course) to roast some marshmallows and tell stories. Or you can do it indoor if you have a fireplace.

4 OUTDOOR CLEANUP Winter is coming. Yards can use cleaning up, gardens have to be cleaned up, too, so they can be most productive next spring.

LEAVES They are not falling yet, but they are changing colors and will start falling soon. Raking leaves is not only a chore, but can also be fun, especially jumping into big fluffy piles or making projects with the most colorful leaves.

Morah Dini's 3rd grade students learned that all Tishrei-long we keep depositing Mitzvot and memorable Jewish experiences to our "account" that we can withdraw from in the weeks and months ahead. But as the bottle says: No Deposit, No Return. You have to put in if you want to be able to take out.

OLD IMMIGRATION AND NEW

The "New Immigration" the 8th grade history book is talking about is 150 years old. They differentiated between immigrants to this country before Civil War and afterwards. It shifted from western Europe to eastern, from native English speakers to a potpourri of languages, and there were differences in religious affiliation (for example most Jewish immigration began after 1880 when life became more difficult in Eastern Europe and Jews sought better opportunities in the USA). They learned about the "Push" and "Pull" reasons that brought people to this country.

PYTHAGOREAN THEOREM

Mrs. Roland's class learned an ancient mathematical formula regarding the square of a hypotenuse (longest side) of a triangle: $A^2 + B^2 = C^2$. It works!
